**School Reopening Update** 

CMO and site leadership teams have been planning our schools reopening. Our plan will be informed by the following guidebooks:

- The California Department of Education (CDE) Guidebook for reopening schools (Click HERE).
- The California Department of Public Health (CDPH) Industry Guidance for Schools and School Programs (Click <u>HERE</u>).

Here are some very high-level takeaways relevant for us:

- We can have students back on campus, but only if we maintain safe social distancing (6ft.). This will require us to be creative in terms of staggering when students are on campus.
- We will need to have a screening protocol for allowing students on campus. We already have protocols established for child supervision that we have been using for the past three months. However, we will have to scale up to accommodate more students.
- We will need to adhere to healthy respiratory hygiene protocols for students and staff (similar to those we had in place before our schools shut down).
- We will need to have strict cleaning and disinfecting protocols for classrooms.
- We will have to continue distance learning for those families who do not want to send their children back to school along with on-site learning. We will have a hybrid approach with the through-line being your online class.


Just a reminder, the 2020-21 school year will begin as scheduled on August 3rd.
